## Hello Friends,

A big thank you to all the volunteers who join our group litter picking sessions or do their own thing to remove rubbish from the woodlands. In 2022, we clocked up nearly 300 volunteer hours on litter picking, which plays an important role in keeping the woodlands safe for the plants and wildlife.

It is a surprisingly satisfying activity with some unexpected finds - frequently just one shoe, tyres, and on one occasion a safe. There is some good news - that there has been a reduction in the levels of littering than we saw during the pandemic years, and the number of Halloween pumpkins left in the woods this year was significantly less. However, garden and builders' waste remains a problem. Although some people believe that their dumped garden waste will harmlessly rot down in the woods, it actually represents a serious threat to the woodland, changing the ph. levels of the soil and introducing potentially diseased and invasive plants to the habitat. Why not join us at a litter picking session - all equipment is provided and you can enjoy a couple of hours with a friendly group of people in the fresh air, while also playing your part in protecting the woodlands.

#### **Being a Litter Picking Volunteer**

I first joined in the litter picking sessions a few years ago, to contribute to the improvement of the local areas and do my bit for the community. I find it very rewarding to do. I get a bit of exercise and I appreciate the better, cleaner environment. Also, we often have people who are passing by who thank us for doing so. It's nice to know it doesn't go unnoticed.

It can become quite addictive, and it's hard to stop at the end of a session as there's always another piece of litter that you notice hiding under a bush, or in the gutter, or around the next corner. Some litter can be deeply-hidden in the undergrowth or in the middle of brambles, or even buried in the soil; often just a little corner is poking out and it needs a bit of digging and heaving to extract it, so a workout is a bonus! We usually end up with many bags full (approx. 10-20), quite a few tyres, and other odd items; fly-tipped waste as well.

Wherever I see litter now, on a roadside or in a car park, or anywhere, it really bothers me. A lot of litter gets blown around by the wind, but it is often so carelessly and thoughtlessly discarded, and I think it is such a shame that some people are so disconnected from the environment they live in.

Litter can also affect wildlife, with birds and animals ingesting plastic, using it to make their nests, or getting caught up in it, all of which can affect their wellbeing. Litter also pollutes streams and other waterways, which can affect the ecology by creating water pools/flooding or blocked drainage. I have also done river and beach cleans (along the Thames and when I'm on holiday) and it is shocking the amount of plastic and other materials found (bags, bottles, food boxes/trays, ropes, fishing line, balloons, etc.). I feel that if I do all I can then I feel more positive about the future of our precious green spaces, our own local environment and beyond: we all need to do our bit for our wonderful world.
