# **Friends of Oxleas Woodlands**

July 2023 NEWSLETTER



Hello Friends.

It's the time of year when our roses are scenting the air and looking spectacular.

I'm pleased to report that in Castle Wood we didn't lose any to frosts this winter and all are now blooming wonderfully for their second or third summer since volunteers replaced them.

The manure that we added to the beds last year has really made a difference, enriching the soil and maintaining some moisture in the hot weather that we have had recently. Unfortunately, we didn't receive any bark chippings, which would have added an extra layer of protection from the sun.

In an effort to control weeds, two of the beds have now been planted with *Saxifraga* × *urbium* (London Pride) and a third has some *Stachys byzantina* (Lamb's Ear). The hope is that these will spread over time below the roses to reduce the amount of exposed soil where weeds flourish. It will mean that we spend less time weeding.

The remaining roses in Jack Wood are also in bloom. There are less and less of them each year as they are very old now and the soil around their roots is poor and shallow. Unfortunately, we don't currently have enough volunteers to properly look after this garden. Perhaps you could join us? To find out more email oxleas.volunteers@gmail.com

## Friends of Oxleas Woodlands

#### **Oxleas London Pride**

When we heard that Eltham Palace were thinning out their Saxifraga × urbium (London Pride) last Autumn we leapt at the chance of giving some of the plants a new home. As the rose garden is close to the SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest) area and within the nature reserve, we do have to be careful



about where plants come from, and specifically whether they might have pests, disease or traces of chemicals. Knowing this to be a safe source, we quarantined the plants over winter with a volunteer then planted them this spring as ground cover below the roses in Jack Wood. They are already looking great.

### **Lower Path Improvements**

Complete Ecology contractors began work on Lower Path in Jack Wood during June. They have created a new entrance at the Oxleas Meadow end, replaced one bridge and improved the approaches to the second bridge. A top layer of selfcompacting gravel will be laid on top of the base - visible in the photographs below.





### **Fencing**

Whilst out and about, you may notice some fences have been put up. On the advice of the Ecology expert that we engaged last year, we will be putting up more fences. These will be temporary and will allow the vegetation to recover by reducing erosion, compaction and trampling. Please respect these boundaries and enjoy other areas in the woodlands.

**Castle Wood Meadow** 

Whilst the birds have been nesting, our conservation volunteers have been staying out of the woodlands and have instead donated many hours of their time and energy to Castle Wood Meadow.

If you're out for a walk in the area, you will probably notice that the paths are much wider and the bin is much more accessible. By cutting back the undergrowth that had grown across the tarmac, we encourage people to stay on the path and allow the verges to be a safe place for wildlife. The boundaries between two habitats. in this case Meadow and Woods, are known as Ecotones. By clearing old brambles. we encourage fresh growth and increased biodiversity.

You might also notice we've cut back some low-hanging branches and you probably won't notice that we've started removing saplings from below the mature trees. This will help them thrive for another 200 years. The whole meadow is planned to be mowed this summer.

#### **Fires**

Last year, we had some devastating fires in Hotel Field and extensively in Shepherdleas Wood - where the damage to spring bulbs may never recover.

Please remember that fires & BBQs are not permitted in any part of Oxleas Woodlands; the ground is just too dry for a fire to be put out safely, however 'safe' you think it might be.



If you do come across a fire or a piece of ground that is smouldering, please call the fire brigade. You might want to use <u>What3Words</u> to help them locate you and the fire.

### Water

During hot dry weather, it is hard for animals to find water in the woodlands. If you have a garden, consider putting water out for birds and other wildlife. Hedgehogs wander an average of 2km every night so make a 10cm hole in your fence and look out for prickly nocturnal visitors.

### **Amphibians**

The rain at the end of June encouraged toadlets to leave the pond they were born in and to set off to find new homes. They will hibernate over winter in leaf mulch before returning to their birth-pond in spring.



### **Members' Meeting**

Wednesday 21st was our Members' Meeting. We had the first viewing of the <u>Pathways Fundraising Film</u>. An



update from the Steering Group included the council deeming a Jack Wood Terrace alcove unsafe, plus the consideration of a safe-guarding policy. Steve Bolton from Butterfly Conservation then spoke about how to improve our grasslands.
