Hello Friends,

This month, a visit to Oxleas Woodlands promises a picturesque display of autumnal colours above and a diverse array of fungi below, creating a delightful experience for your senses on a crisp autumn day.

However, don't forget to don your boots, as the recent rains and storms have transformed many paths into muddy streams. The current conditions provide an excellent opportunity to observe the impact of our Pathways Project in Jack Wood. Along Lower Path, you'll encounter stretches of renovated gravel paths adorned with fallen leaves, providing a solid walking surface. Yet, in other sections, be prepared to navigate through thick mud.

Notably, on the renewed path segments, visitors are adhering to the designated route. But between these areas people avoid the mud; widening the paths, or creating alternative routes. Wherever possible please try to stick to the paths. This will help reduce the erosion of path surrounds and damage to tree roots. Completing the paths project is so important to preserving the wonderful woodland habitat.

We've raised £67,179 for Jack Wood, aiming for £113,000. Despite an unsuccessful £20,000 bid, we're actively seeking donors. Thanks

A rewarding Woodland Conservation Session took place when a team of engineers from SKY joined us for a Corporate Volunteering Session. We cleared a large area of holly in Jack Wood, opening the woodland floor to light and encouraging regeneration in our beautiful woods.



Wood Chippings

Our volunteers have been working hard in Castle Wood Rose Garden (actually they always work hard) as Royal Borough of Greenwich Parks Department delivered several tonnes of wood chippings for the rose beds.

Last year we nurtured the new roses in Castle Wood Garden with well rotted horse manure. As this rots down, the topping of wood chips will hold in moisture and help reduce the weeds.
